

Dear Fríends,

I wonder if you have noticed that God is doing wonderful things among us!

Well, it's tangible and real and it makes such a difference to our lives. People often comment on 'it' when they come into church. But what is 'it'? ... 

As we wave goodbye to the Easter celebrations and look on to Pentecost, I have had the joy of experiencing and reflecting on how the

many groups and activities I have been able to run and set up are now overlapping. My favourite service of the Easter season had to be Pet Palm Sunday, a joyous all age service where we had such a great mixture of people in attendance, from toddler group faces, to Café church team, to youth



group members and those in the "normal Sunday congregation" too (not my words, but I'm not sure how else to describe all the rest of those there!!). We can't forget the many dogs, pair of



guinea pigs and a chicken that attended as well. We had a drama performed by a variety of ages, prayers said by the children, and refreshments served by our amazing team too.

This term I've really seen the youth group members step up and come across into the Church building more. They have attended café church, they have popped in for a evening communion as part of our youth group



meeting, they have helped at Free Craft events for families and so much more. They are researching charities that run sponsored child programmes ready to present to our PCC so we can chose a new charity to support, have done another community litter pick and are really taking an interest in wider church activities. In April I will be taking 4 of them to Sheffield Cathedral to be part of Young Leader Community meeting to input on Diocese events and to help plan Breathe Deep, the youth day in January that we attended. 

We're so excited that 613,326 nature lovers took part in the Birdwatch

this year, spotting a phenomenal 9,720,027 birds.



Perched in top spot for the 21st year running was the chirpy House Sparrow.

We also saw the Great Tit move into 7th place, pushing the Goldfinch down a spot. *[that's the one who wears a black tie and shouts "teacher, teacher, teacher, teach!"]*

What is No Mow May?

Plantlife, the wild plant conservation charity, started the No Mow May campaign in 2019 to encourage garden owners to put their mower away during May and let wildflowers grow. In the UK we have lost 97

per cent of British wildflower meadows since the 1930s, which has removed a vital source of food for pollinators such as bees and butterflies.

What are the benefits?

Leaving your grass to grow a little longer can have huge benefits to your environment and to wildlife. Even grass mown every four weeks will provide plants for pollinators. Less mowing encourages wildflowers to grow in your lawn and this is beneficial to pollinating insects such as hoverflies, bees and butterflies. Wildflowers also provide food for other creatures such as birds and small mammals. 'No Mow May' participants have reported almost 100 species of pollinators on their lawns including 25 types of moth and butterfly, and 24 types of bee. A loss and change sheet was circled individually and Feelings were explored further by choosing a feeling photograph to illustrate how you were feeling. We moved on to choose a feeling now showing how all was calm again after the storm and how positive thoughts can overcome negative feelings.

It is so important to recognise feelings, the importance of talking and sharing with a trusted person. I spoke of the "elephant in the room" and gave out a picture of an elephant to remind them, and the poem which applies to the death of someone you love or could apply to any other loss or big change which causes distress.

Talking can help.

My dear Nephew Darren

It never fails to amaze me how, in church life, an issue can suddenly become an Issue. In the last month, we have acquired an Issue: a proposal to convert a space at the back of church into a kitchen. Inevitably, battle lines have been drawn and trenches dug. Attendance at church council meetings has soared and unofficial sub-committees meet in the car park after Services. It's obvious that feelings are running high, because people have become remarkably polite to one another.

Some who are wildly in favour see it as an opportunity of being able to leave the pews ten minutes early, in order to get ready for the rush for weak coffee and damp biscuits. I can already hear in my mind the final hymn being drowned by kettles being filled, biscuit tins opened, cups thunderingly placed on saucers, while the volunteers discuss the dress sense of others in the congregation in deafening whispers.

I was a little surprised to hear that Colonel Wainwright was all in favour – until I realised that it would give him a place to totter into to read his newspaper once he got bored with my sermon, which usually seems to happen in the first minute. Naturally, smaller turf wars have broken out alongside the major battle. There is conflict about whether we should get new crockery, what colour carpeting tiles would look right – and most importantly of all, who will take charge of the coffee rota.

Others are totally against the project: the treasurer dreads the thought of signing yet more cheques, the churchwardens worry about removing

pews which have quietly hidden the dry rot, and the theologically angstridden agonise about the fact that St Paul never mentioned coffee after Sabbath worship.

Naturally, I encourage all sides, especially if it will bring any possibility of progress to a halt. I proposed bringing in flasks of coffee, thus stopping anyone being able to escape before the end of the Service; I suggested drinks being brought to people in the pews, thus ruining the Colonel's hopes of finding a safe haven; I organised a group to study High Priestly attitudes to refreshments in the Temple in Jerusalem in Leviticus.

I am sure that by the time all these groups have come up with their conclusions, we will have safely moved on to fight the next Issue.

Faith in Families to run Wales' first multibank

Cwtch Mawr, Wales' first 'multibank', has been officially opened by Mark Drakeford, until recently First Minister and Gordon Brown, the former Prime Minister.

Multibanks are based on the foodbank model, but provide a wider range of non-perishable goods, enabling businesses to redistribute surplus unsold items to people for free.

Cwtch Mawr will be run by Faith in Families, with support from Gordon Brown and Amazon, who co-founded the multibank initiative. The Welsh Government is providing £125,000 for the start-up of the project, with other support coming from local partners including Swansea Council, Pobl Housing Association and The Moondance Foundation.

Cwtch Mawr will be supported by donations from Amazon and other companies, including cleaning wipes, sanitary products, toilet paper, kitchen rolls and toys. New and reusable household goods, food, clothes, toiletries, furnishings, bedding, children and baby goods are expected to be provided in future.

The multibank model encourages businesses to cut down on waste through the creation of a bank of surplus household goods. Cwtch Mawr plans to donate more than 300,000 surplus essential goods to 40,000 families in poverty this year.

• Confusing communications from HMRC; or even


without specific concerns, needing the assurance of a "tax health check".




